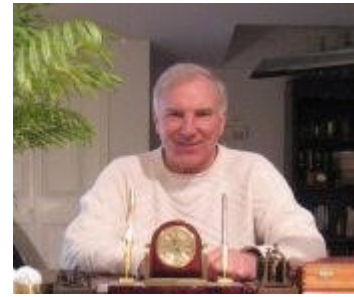

Our final speaker was Bill Truran, County Historian. He spoke on heritage in the area. Bill stated that he has published 5 books of the history and heritage of Ogdensburg and Franklin. Books are available at Sparta Bookstore, North Country Pharmacy and at the gift shop at Sterling Hill Mining Museum.

Mr. Truran discussed the significant historical markers in our area – the Sterling Hill Mine; Parker Mine at Franklin Firehouse and Palmer Plant, in the middle of the town of Franklin. He discussed the Young Historian Program where 4th grade students: Ben Franklin; 8th grade students: Thomas Edison; 12th grade students: Babe Ruth. Jeanne Sweetman. The famous names are because each of them either spent time or significant naming. Ben Franklin – Franklin furnace; Thomas Edison – Edison on Sparta



Mountain; Babe Ruth - spent time in the area with friends. George Washington also traversed the area during the Revolutionary War.

Bill discussed his Cornish descent and how 21 different cultures settled in the Ogdensburg/Franklin area.

Bill also charged us with finding specimens of the area history, in the attic or talking with an elderly neighbor.

As Bill finished his presentation, he opened the floor for questions. Several guests asked questions or added to the discussion with recollections of days gone by.

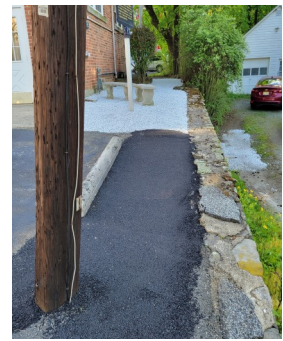
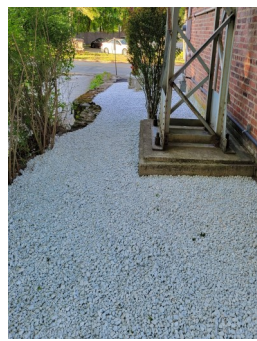
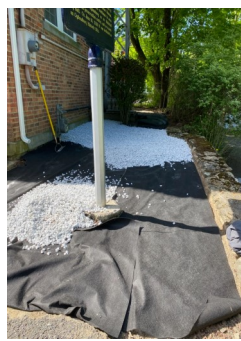
BEAUTIFICATION EFFORTS



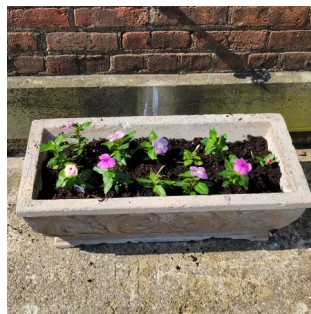

SEPTEMBER MEETING

We are honored to have Paul Michael Kane as our guest speaker—discussing his article and photos of our very own Fox Film Vaults.

Here is an excerpt from his article: "In the early 1900s, anything captured on film was done so on a cellulose nitrate stock. This included photography, X-rays, newsreels and motion pictures. This stock, often called nitrocellulose, gradually decomposed, releasing nitric acid – terrifyingly flammable as one of the only compounds that doesn't require oxygen to burn. Trying to actually put out a nitrocellulose-fire with just water would oftentimes exacerbate an inferno. This stuff could literally burn underwater.

As the industry progressed, it was discovered that storing these reels at low temperatures resulted in a delay of the deterioration. Fox Studios, located in Hollywood, California would ship, by rail, their archive of film reels to the off-site storage facilities built in Ogdensburg, deeming them far too dangerous to keep near populated areas or too close to the studios themselves.

This was a common practice among the various studios, the equivalent of today's offsite digital backup. The vaults were, most times, sequestered to rural populations where, should a fire occur, minimal property loss could be expected."

OGDENSBURG HISTORICAL SOCIETY

The Ogdensburg Historical Society is a non-profit and non-partisan organization formed not only to ascertain and preserve the history of Ogdensburg, NJ, but also to foster the education and enjoyment of its residents and visitors. The OHS obtained grant monies in 1988 and 1989 to refurbish the 1910 school addition/firehouse to be converted into the Old Schoolhouse/Firehouse Museum—the society's headquarters.

The museum's first floor lobby holds a display case (that was originally in the grade school) of minerals from the Ogdensburg Zinc Mine. The fire truck bays contain the Ogdensburg Fire Department's retired 1935 and 1959 American LaFrance Pumper trucks. In June of 2006, the bays were dedicated in the memory of William "Doly" Dolan and Joseph Fitzgibbons, Sr. These men were former students, OFD fire chiefs and OHS charter members and

vice presidents—all within the walls of this building.

The second floor serves as a meeting hall for the society's meetings. It contains showcases which hold donated Ogdensburg memorabilia such as postcards of old Ogdensburg, school history and graduation pictures, a display of the zinc mill operations, a scale model of the mine's hoist, and Ogden family history documents. There are also old exhibits of Thomas A. Edison memorabilia to honor the ten years Edison spent mining iron ore at the old Edison Ore Milling Company on Sparta Mountains.

The OHS sponsors two annual dinners. In June, a catered picnic meeting is held at the Sterling Hill Mining Museum. In October, an Ethnic Dinner is held at the school where each family is asked to bring a covered dish that represents their ethnic background.
